Abstract: The PAT is a 40-item instrument designed to measure two aspects of parental response to child behavior: anger and leisure. These two aspects form the two subscales of the PAT. Anger is assessed in terms of one's responses to negative child behaviors. Pleasure measures affective responses to positive child behaviors. These two emotions are considered salient in the maintenance of punitive or abusive behavior towards children. The PAT is useful in monitoring interventions with abusive parents or siblings. The positive and negative child behaviors that are contained in the PAT were designed to span various developmental age groups, but basically are appropriate for parents with a child aged 2 to 11 years old.

With nurturance assumed to be an important factor in the development of children's self-esteem, the PNS can be a valuable tool for helping assess the child's perception of change in nurturance as a result of family counseling. Identical forms of the PNS are used for both mothers and fathers changing only gender references as appropriate.

Abstract: The Personal Experience Inventory for Adults (PEI-A) is a self-report inventory to assist substance abuse providers in problem identification, treatment referral, and individualized planning associated with addressing the abuse of alcohol and other drugs by adults. It is not a screening instrument. The PEI- A provides information about an individual's substance abuse patterns and problems. It also helps identify psychosocial problems. The PEI-A consists of two parts. The Problem Severity section consists of 120 items organized into 10 Problem Severity scales. The Psychosocial section consists of 150 items distributed across 8 Personal Adjustment scales, 3 Environmental scales, 10 Problem screens, and 2 Validity indicators. Abstract: The Reiss Screen for Maladaptive Behavior, Version 1.1 (Reiss Screen) assesses mental health problems of adolescents and adults with mental retardation. The scale is completed by teachers, caretakers, parents, or supervisors who know the subject well enough to rate him or her on 38 traits of maladaptive behavior. It takes approximately 10 minutes to complete the scale, which has 8 empirically derived scales: aggressive disorder, psychosis, autism, depression (behavioral and physical symptoms), avoidant disorder, dependent personality disorder, and paranoia. The instrument also evaluates the probability that the subject has a problem with drug abuse, over activity, self-injury, sexual behavior, or suicidal tendency and stealing.
